Ticket prices are \$10 for adults and children in the reserved seat section. General admission is \$7 for adults and \$5 for students or children 18 years old and younger.

Atlanta, Georgia for mechanical training and learned to rebuild engines and transmissions.

He was supposed to be placed in a rebuilding shop in the USA, but as things sometimes go in the military, he ended up in Korea during the fiercest battles of the war. He was in the 25th Division, 725 Ordnance group, and in his words, he spent a lot of his time, "Lying in the mud exchanging truck engines and transmissions."

He wasn't on the front lines but was close enough to see and hear the fighting, especially when he was on inspection tours where they would take big wreckers and haul the trucks back behind the lines to work on them. This was in 1951.

He got to come home in September of 1952, and went to Camp Carson near Colorado Springs, Colorado where he said, "We laid around doing nothing until I was discharged December 9, 1952."

When he came back home, he farmed around Hobbs for a couple of years and then bought a truck and started hauling everything he could find to haul. In the 1950s he hauled bricks and car bodies to Del Rio. He stayed busy hauling hay to Big Lake, Stephenville and Comanche. At first he hauled little bales and then they

started baling hay in cubes, and he got the job hauling these to Gore Dairy at Comanche.

He was hauling hay from Dexter, and Carlsbad, New Mexico as well as from Higginbotham and all around this region.

In 1963 he moved to Higginbotham and bought a place near the store. He built a house and a mechanic shop and began working on his own trucks. He went from his one truck to having five trucks and keeping them all busy. In 1991 he sold all but one of his trucks.

He sold his house and mechanic shop to the Higginbotham Gin and moved to Seminole in December of 1995.

Sadly his wife had to be placed in the nursing home where she passed away September 18, 2010.

While visiting his wife on a constant, daily, basis Raymond became acquainted with many of the people at the nursing home. He became vaguely acquainted with the lady who came and played the piano there, Bette Stevens. He had worked with friends of hers, and they had several mutual friends. So their paths had crossed several times.

Bette's first husband, Bill Stevens had passed away in 1978. After the death of his wife,

Raymond continued visiting his friend Roy Baccus and others at the nursing home. He began to get better acquainted with Bette. After some time he invited her out to dinner.

Bette didn't think Raymond even knew her last name so she, being coy, told him to give her a call. She said, "My number is in the phone book." To her surprise he called her and they began dating.

They were married October 28, 2011.

Between them they have eight children. Bette has one son and two daughters. Her son, Dallas, and his wife, Debbi, live in Denver City. Her daughter, Debbie, and her husband, Gary Titus, live in Hobbs, New Mexico. And her other daughter, Donna Miris, lives in Kerrville.

Bette has four grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Raymond has two daughters and three sons. Brenda and her husband, Billy Bob Cross live in Marietta, Oklahoma. One son, Elton, and wife Betty live in Lindsay, Texas west of Gainsville. Another son, Richard and his wife, Janie, also live in Lindsay. His daughter, Sheila, and husband, Bill Vuicich, live in Whiterock, in north Gaines County, south of Denver City. He and Bette have both gone through some health problems but are both doing better at this time. Raymond feels he is straightened out over his problems. Bette still has to use a walker to steady herself, but she feels better and is able to go do what she wants to do and do.

Raymond used to like to fish, and had a boat and a trailer house at Possum Kingdom Lake, where he liked to fish for bass and stripers. He sold his trailer house and brought his boat to Seminole, but he has since sold it, also.

He says his hobby, now, is playing dominoes. He plays regularly at Senior Citizens. Bette's hobby is playing the piano. She plays at a singing at Senior Citizens each second Thursday of the month at 6:30.

They compromised on religion after their marriage. They alternately attend the First Assembly of God Church and the South Seminole Baptist Church.

When asked what his plans for the future are, Raymond quickly answered, "It depends on who gets elected..." But then he said he plans to stay in Seminole. They both said they love Seminole and don't want to live anywhere else.

They wanted to say thanks to all their friends and neighbors for being so caring and good to them during their sicknesses and the loss of their spouses.
